

Support for education

• Over the past 3 years, Pinellas County Schools has trained and matched students with over 2,250 mentors.

• Pinellas County Schools has retained 92% of their mentors.

• 95% of the students who are mentored in the Mayor Mentors & More Program graduate.

• 82% of the African American males who are mentored have GPAs of 2.5 or higher.

Support with day-to-day living

• Mentors help improve a young person's self-esteem.

• Mentors provide support for students trying new behaviors. • Youth who meet regularly with their mentors are 46% less likely than their peers to start using illegal drugs and 27% less likely to begin using alcohol.

• Mentors teach young people how to relate well to all kinds of people and help them strengthen communication skills.

Support in the workplace

• Mentors help young people set career goals and start taking steps to realize them.

• Mentors can use their personal contacts to help young people meet industry professionals, find Internships, and locate job possibilities.

• Mentors introduce young people to professional resources and organizations they may not know about.

• Mentors can help their mentees learn how to seek and keep jobs. At its most basic level, mentoring helps because it guarantees that a young person knows there is someone who cares about them. A child is not alone in dealing with day-to-day worries.

Think back. Did you know how to study for a test or make plans for college? Do you remember wanting your first car or looking for a part-time job? Simple things that seem easy or straightforward to you now may appear to be a complete mystery to a young person.

Mentors provide their mentees with an experienced friend who is there to help in any number of situations.

Research confirms what we anecdotally or intuitively know — that mentoring works.
