The BIG leap from 2nd Grade to 3rd Grade

- "Reading to learn" more than "learning to read"
- Increase reading and writing stamina
- More abstract thinking in math requires a foundation of basic addition/subtraction fact mastery and skip-counting fluency
- Expected to use more self control and follow directions
- Be able to stay on task independently and cooperate with others in small groups to accomplish tasks

3rd Grade Academic Milestones

1. Reading: By third grade, most kids can read fluently and are starting to comprehend more complex texts.

2. Math: Third graders are using more abstract thinking in math. They are introduced to multiplication and division and are diving deeper into understanding fractions and geometry.

3. Writing: At this stage, third graders are using complete sentences and paragraphs with proper spelling, grammar and punctuation. They begin learning cursive handwriting and keyboarding.

3rd Grade Social Milestones

- 1. Building friendships: At this age, children start to form deeper friendships and understand the importance of being a good friend.
- 2. Resolving conflict: As their social skills develop, third graders may encounter conflicts with friends and learn how to resolve them through communication and compromise.
- 3. Empathy: Third graders are becoming more aware of others' feelings and perspectives, and can show empathy toward their peers.

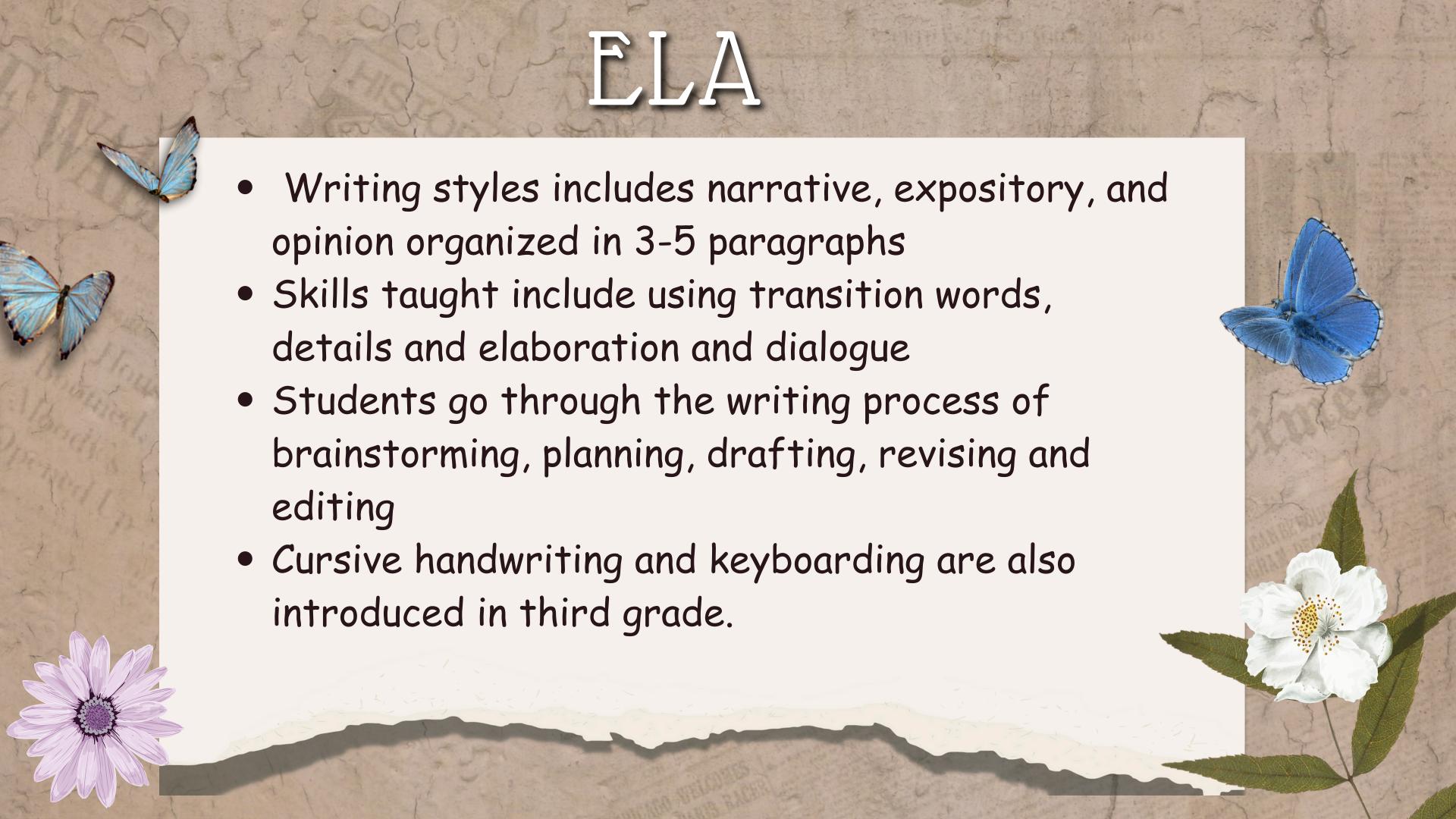


ELA

English Language Arts Core is 120 minutes comprised of word study, reading, writing, and handwriting.

 An additional instruction/intervention/enrichment time of 30 minutes occurs daily.

• Curriculum consists of informational(nonfiction), literary (fiction), and poetry texts. Standards focus on skills such as identifying character changes, theme, text structure, text features, main idea, author's purpose, figurative language, and comparing two texts.,



3rd Grade Promotion Requirements

• The portfolio is a "good cause" promotion option for students who score a Level 1 on the spring FAST assessment.

 The portfolio is an organized collection of evidence of the student's mastery of the B.E.S.T. English Language Arts Standards that are assessed by the grade 3 statewide, standardized English Language Arts assessment.

• For each benchmark, there will be at least eight (8) items assessed and the student must demonstrate 70% percent mastery for all items assessed per benchmark.

As the year progresses, you will receive a sign and return report after
each portfolio assessment communicating your child's progress toward
meeting the 70% mastery of EACH of the 13 benchmarks.

Third Grade Good Cause Letter – 2025-2026

Dear Parents or Guardians of Third Graders.

As you may know, the Florida State Legislature passed a law that affects the promotion/retention of students in third grade. In the spring, your child will be taking the state assessment, *Florida Assessment of Student Thinking* (FAST).

If your child scores at a Level 2 or above on the FAST Reading Assessment (Progress Monitoring Cycle 3 in May), he or she is eligible to be promoted. If a student does not score at the designated level on the PM3 FAST assessment, he or she is considered to have a substantial problem in reading and cannot be promoted to the fourth grade on a regular promotion. However, the score on the FAST assessment is not the sole determiner for promotion. If a child meets one of the following "good cause" exemptions identified by the state, the child may be considered for promotion.

- Students who demonstrate through a student portfolio that they are reading at least at the designated
 passing level on the FAST assessment. Every third grader in Pinellas County will have a portfolio. The
 contents of the Pinellas County portfolio were chosen by a committee consisting of teachers from a variety of
 schools in the district.
- Limited English proficient students who have had less than 2 years of instruction in the English for Speakers of Other Languages program.

*******The good cause exemption for ESOL students is defined as: Limited English proficient students who have had less than 2 years of instruction in an English for Speakers of Other Languages program. Less than 2 years of ESOL services starts from the "Date Entered U.S. School" (DEUSS). This state-reported data element can be found in FOCUS on the ELL tab. Do not use the Date of Entry into ESOL as a definition of 2 years of ESOL instruction. ********

- Students with disabilities whose Individual Education Plan (IEP) indicates that participation in the statewide assessment program is not appropriate (i.e., special diploma).
- 4. Students who score at or above the 50th percentile on Istation after the PM3 FAST assessment.
- 5. Students with disabilities who participate in the FAST assessment and who have an Individual Education Plan (IEP) or a Section 504 plan that indicates that the student has received intensive remediation in reading for more than 2 years but still demonstrates a deficiency in reading and was previously retained in kindergarten, grade 1, grade 2, or grade 3.
- Students who have received intensive remediation in reading for 2 or more years but still demonstrate a
 deficiency <u>and</u> who were previously retained in kindergarten, grade 1, grade 2, or grade 3 for a total of 2 years.
 Students may not spend more than two years in third grade.

The school principal will recommend any good cause exemptions, based on evaluative data, to the district superintendent who will accept or reject the recommendations.

3rd Grade Reading Portfolio

Students are given the portfolio common assessments for good cause promotion to 4th grade. According to the State Board of Education, to be accepted as meeting the portfolio option, a student's portfolio must include at least 8 items assessed per benchmark and the student must demonstrate 70% mastery for each of 13 benchmarks.

Reading Portfolio Parent Communication

After each portfolio assessment, a letter will be sent home with your child's results. This letter is a sign & return document.



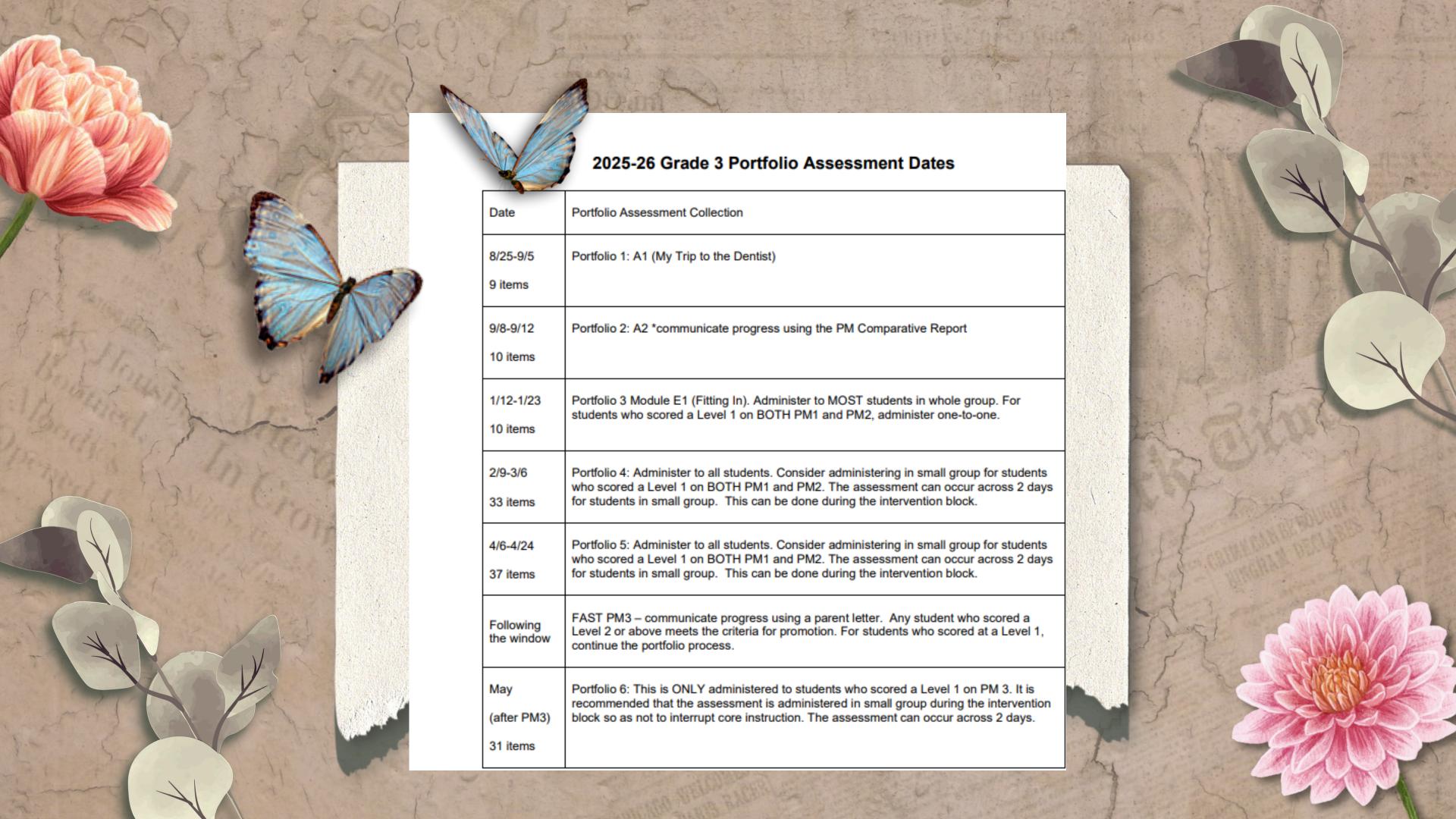

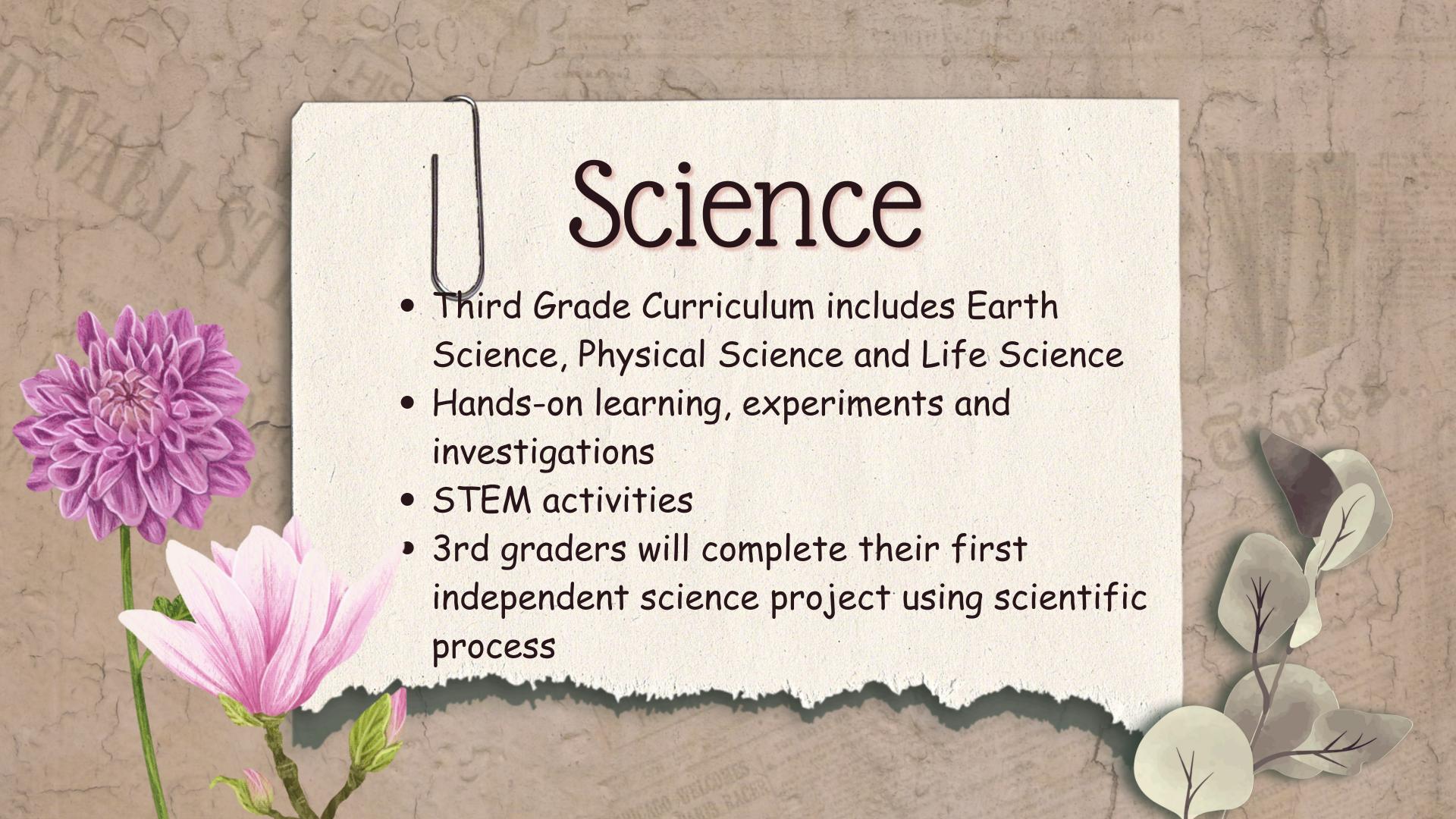


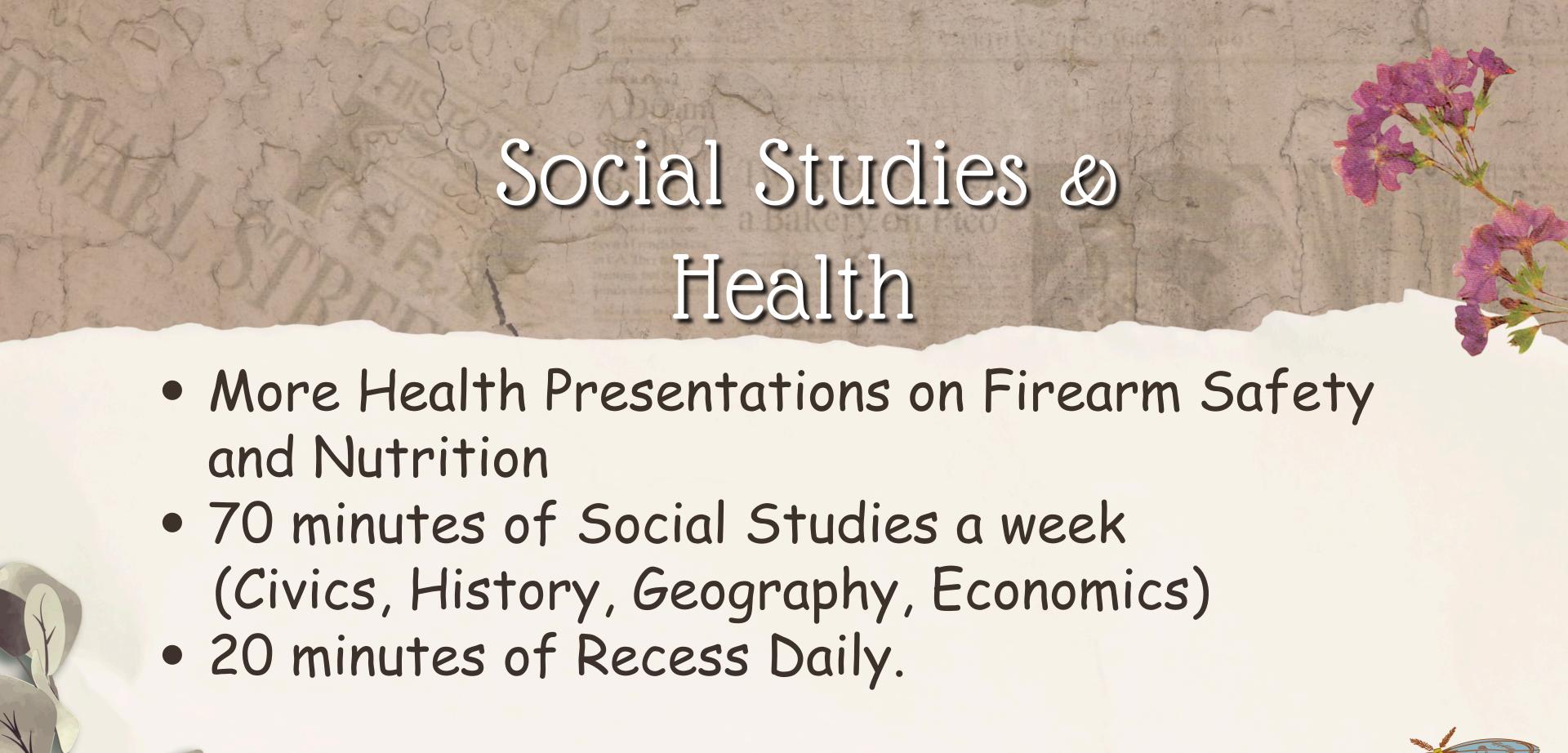


Mathematics

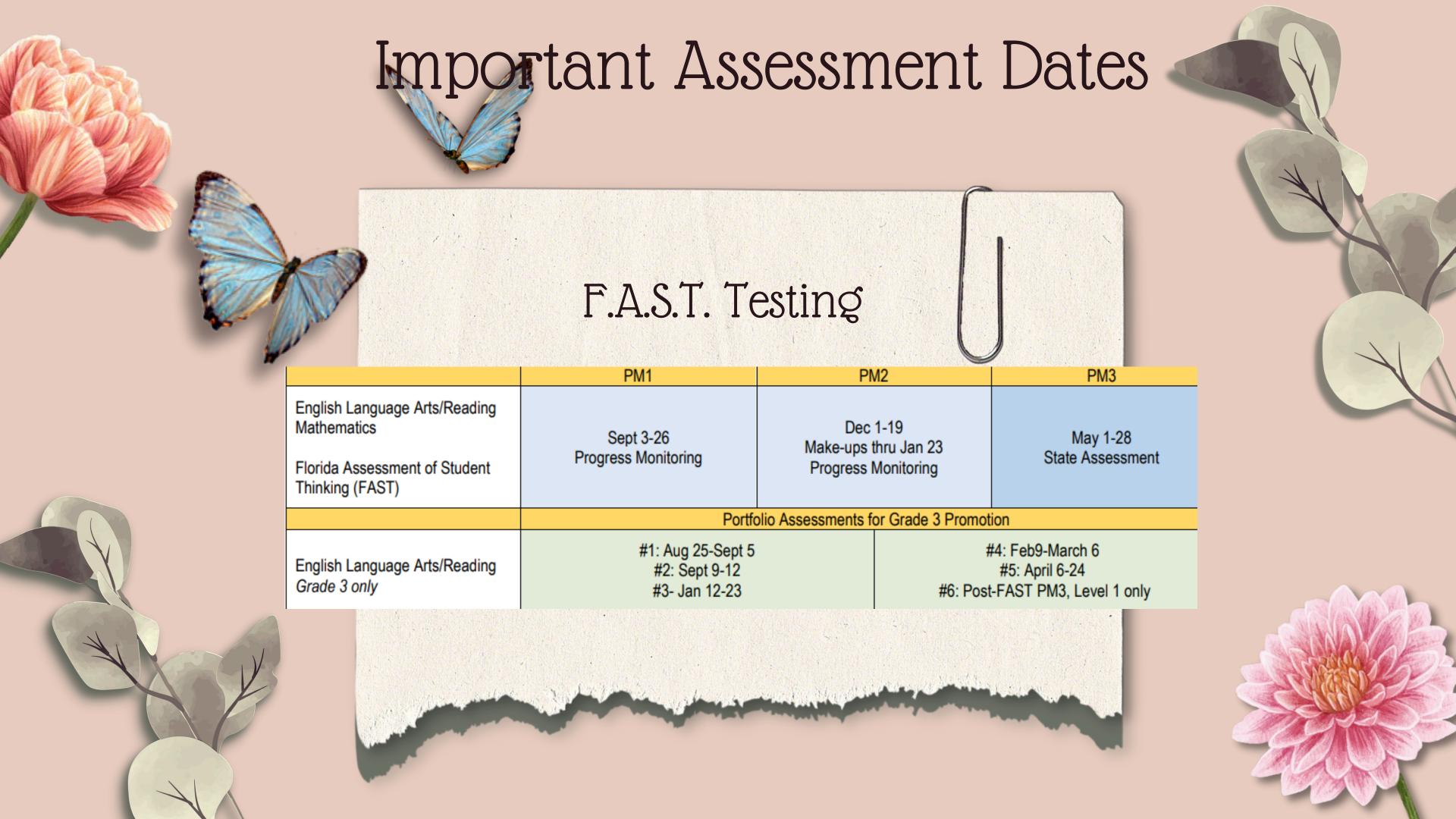
- Math is a 75 minute block made up of number routines, whole group lesson, small groups, math games, Dash Robots math/coding challenges and Dreambox.

- Students gain a conceptual understanding of multiplication & division (not memorization). They will solve problems using all four operations, dig deeper into fractions, geometry, and measurement.

Homework

- Third graders write down homework in their planner. As an additional support, homework is posted in the weekly parent newsletter.
- Each homework item must be signed, as well as the planner please review for completeness, accuracy and quality before signing.
- 30 minutes of Amira & 10 Dreambox lessons are due by Friday of each week. Part is done at school and part as homework.



- If your child required a lot of help on math hw or didn't understand a particular problem(s), indicate that at the top of the page and circle the difficult problems so we can review the next day.
- First semester, reading logs require 20 minutes of reading in just right books and a written response (1-2 complete sentences edited for spelling & punctuation). Reading requirements will increase in the 2nd semester.
- A homework warning is not a homework pass--students are required to turn in missing homework the next day to avoid another warning as part of Fundamental policy.

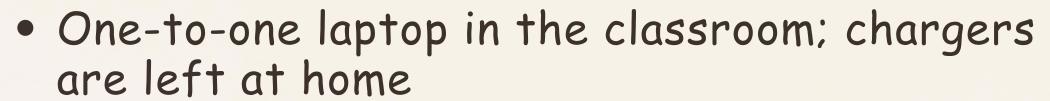

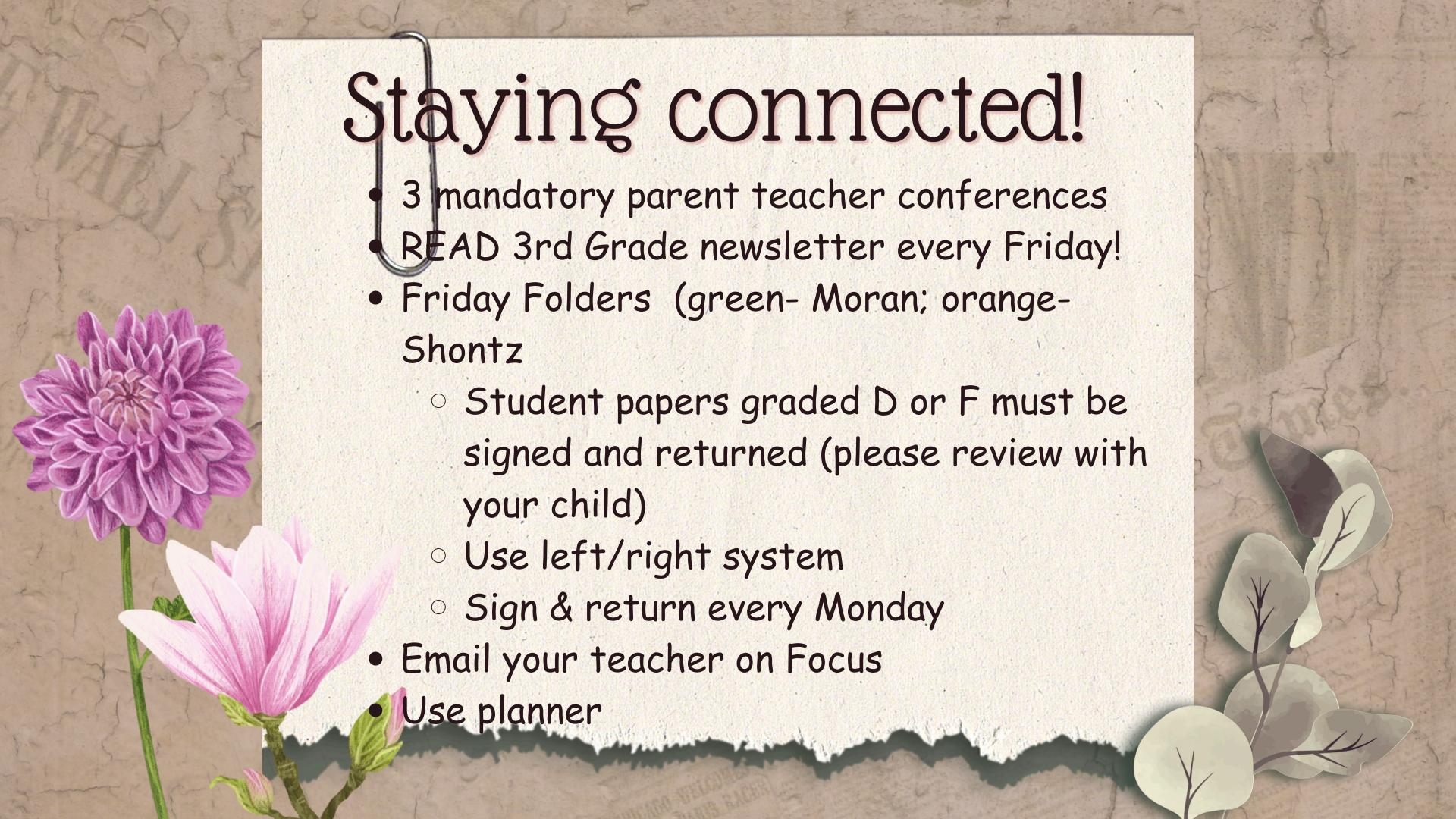

Supporting your 3rd grader

• Encourage independence and start transferring responsibility while staying involved: Give your child opportunities to take ownership of their education and complete tasks on their own with your guidance as needed.

• Foster a love for reading: Read with them and let them see YOU read. Ask them questions about their reading every night (see handout). Please be TRUE to the reading log and make sure they are in reading 20 minutes or more in "just right" books!

• Provide a structured routine: Establish consistent daily routines for getting ready for school, doing homework in a quiet space, and getting to bed early. Ensure time for physical activity and limit screen use.

Supporting your 3rd graders

Practice problem-solving: Engage in activities that require critical thinking and problem-solving skills, like puzzles or board games. Use real world problems and examples in their daily life whenever possible.

- Be patient and supportive: Every child develops at their own pace. Encourage your child's growth, unique gifts, and celebrate their achievements. Create a safe environment for them to express their feelings.
- Encourage more social interactions and less screentime: Provide opportunities for your child to interact with peers through extracurricular activities or playdates. Limit screentime.
