


PINELLAS COUNTY BIRTH RATE & KINDERGARTEN ENROLLMENT TRENDS







JANUARY 2026: LIMITED RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 2026-27

Thriving Schools

Facility Repurposing

- Grade configurations
 - Creation of K-8 schools
 - Early Childhood Centers (birth to grade 2)
- Partner alignment to enhance school programs
- Lease under-utilized building space to partners that bring benefit to school and community within district buildings
- Review of small schools for programmatic viability, fiscal stewardship and building utilization
- Land and/or building sales

Recommendations made in January 2026 will not include large-scale changes to school zones to ensure adequate time for community engagement.


