

Dear First Grade Parents,

We need your help! Math is all around us, even when we are not at school. Your students have been learning about word problems, time, and money. We try to tie math to real world situations, so here are some ways you can help:

Money-identifying coins and their values

- Have students sort your change.
- Have them name the coins and their value.
- You can even have them try to count it!

Time-what does each hand mean and what hour are we in

- Have students identify the hour and minute hand on a clock.
- Ask students throughout the day, "What hour are we in?"

Word Problems-solve real world problems

- Have your student help solve word problems in real life!
 - Grocery Store- There are 3 lemons in the bag. If we put 5 mire lemons in the bag, how many lemons will be in the nag?
 - At a red light- There are 4 cars at the red light. If 2 more cars pull up, how many will be at the red light now?

Fall into a Good Book

Good readers ask themselves questions before, during, and after reading to better understand the author and the meaning of the text. Sometimes these questions are answered directly in the text, and meaning is clarified. Clarifying questions can be about characters, setting, events, problem: who, what, when and where questions. Other times, answers to readers' questions are not found directly in the text or don't have a simple answer. They ask how and why. The reader needs to use prior knowledge to draw conclusions and go beyond the words of the text to find the answer. These questions make the reader wonder, and wondering means the reader is trying to make sense of the text. Encourage your child to ask questions and discuss stories together.

Question Stems:

- What do you think....?
- Why is this happening?
- Why did this character.....?
- How would you feel if....?
- I wonder.....
- What is the author saying?
- How might....?
- How do you know....?

Attendance Corner

Attendance: just how important is it in elementary school? Don't the students have time to make it up? Well, here is what the research shows: If students have excellent attendance in kindergarten and 1st grade, their Language Arts scores in 3rd grade are 50 points higher than children who miss 18 days or more per year. While many of us may think missing kindergarten or 1st grade may not count much, it seems to be very important for future success. Each year is a building block for the next year and it can be hard to catch up with spotty attendance, including tardy days.

If your child is absent, please provide a <u>written</u> excuse (or note from the doctor/dentist) when your child returns to school. Otherwise the absence is considered "unexcused." Additionally families may log on to our school's website at

www.pcsb.org/newheights-es to report their child's absence that day. Click on the icon "Report Student Absence" and then click on the blue circle and it will create an email to the school directly. While we recognize that families at times have emergencies and absences are unavoidable, please do not schedule vacations or family trips during school days.

If you have a child in grades K-5, they may be eligible to check out a laptop computer to use at home for the entire school year! Look for paperwork coming home the week of November 5th.



We encourage our students to draw pictures and use different strategies when solving. Attached you will find some of the strategies that we have been working on with your child in class.



Guidance

The 8 L's of Parenting:

A parent is one of the most influential people in a child's life especially during the elementary years as the child is mentally and physically developing rapidly. Here are some simple ways to keep a lasting relationship going with your child.

1. **LOVE** your child. For your child to be successful, he or she must feel valued. Your gentle touches, smiles and hugs communicate love.

2. **LOOK** for the good in your child and make specific comments on what he or she does well. You must believe in your child's worth before he or she can believe it.

3. **LISTEN**, without judgment, to your child express his or her thoughts and feelings. If you do not listen, your child may attempt to gain your attention by misbehaving.

4. **LAUGH** with your child, not at him or her. Laugh and play together.

5. **LABOR** diligently and with pride so that your child will want to work hard, and do his or her best.

6. **LEARN** new information. Take the time to read and thus instill a love of learning.

7. **LEAVE** the television and other media off.

8. LIVE life to its fullest. Take pleasure in little things.
